## Document 12.10: "The People's Liberation Army Captures Nanjing," a poem by Mao Zedong, 1949

Mao was an accomplished poet who wrote in a traditional style that shows influences from Tang dynasty poets. In April 1949, the People's Liberation Army captured Nanjing, the capital of China under the Guomindang government. Mao wrote the poem to mark this momentous event.

Over Zhongshan<sup>1</sup> swept a storm, headlong,

Our mighty army, a million strong, has crossed the Great River<sup>2</sup>.

The City, a tiger crouching, a dragon curling, outshines its ancient glories<sup>3</sup>;

In heroic triumph heaven and earth have been overturned.

With power and to spare we must pursue the tottering foe

And not ape Xiang Yu the conqueror seeking idle fame.

Were Nature sentient, she too would pass from youth to age,

But Man's world is mutable, seas become mulberry fields.
